

Goal 1: Street Safety & Connectivity

Park Ave & Long Beach Blvd

Improvements

Elements added on Park Ave:

- Reconstruction of sidewalk between Edwards and National Blvds with new brick buffer, street furniture (benches, bike racks, trash cans), decorative light poles, planters/trees and wayfinding "striping" guide
- Milling and repaving of block between Edwards and National Blvds
- New trees in front of the Stop & Shop

Elements added on Long Beach Blvd:

- New crosswalks with ADA ramps at three locations
 - The other crossings along the corridor will be done by the County with their own secured funding as part of a signalization upgrade project
- Benches, trash cans and bike racks at three bus stop locations
- New trees



Goal 1: Street Safety & Park Ave Improvements



ELEMENTS:

A Create generous crossing and pedestrian safety measures at National Blvd

B Upgrade existing crosswalks to stamped, colored concrete to match new crosswalk at Kennedy Plaza
 C Add more planting to protect pedestrians from traffic, and to provide shade and crosswalks at parking, retain and improve existing plantings
 D Expand the intersection to the west of the rail station, expand sidewalk / narrow bus drive to create modest brick plaza

E Create generous crossing and pedestrian safety measures: improve taxi flow, add curbs and median and enlarge pedestrian gathering area at Rev JJ Evans Blvd

Goal 2: Year-round Destination Public Library Auditorium

Updates

- LPC decided not to require a private match for the library projects
- Library hired a professional to get more accurate cost estimates (new cost includes design & engineering, soft costs and contingency that were not included in previous estimate)

Elements added/cost refined:

- New flooring throughout
- More extensive acoustic treatments for the entire space (acoustically rated ceiling, doors, walls)
- Movable partition (acoustically rated) to hold simultaneous events
- Storage area upgrades
- Permanent stage monitors for performers to hear their own sound
- Additional technology to bring the back half of the auditorium closer to technological parity with the front half
- Digital signage to assist in wayfinding and highlight events

Goal 2: Year-round Destination Dance Loft

Description

Lot was formerly the NuClear Dry Cleaners. Ground floor will be subdivided into multiple retail spaces. Second floor will be a mixed-use performing arts rehearsal & performance space, including the Dance Loft.

NYF funding requested for *remediation and construction of the building at large,* performance space equipment and fit-out and signage.

Consultant team is working with project sponsor on NYF decarbonization requirements.

Goal 2: Year-round Destination Two-Family Housing Conversions

Description

Conversion of 5 existing single-family homes into two-family homes in the North Park neighborhood. All five homes are currently rented at market rate. This project would double the number of units and provide affordable housing, which is an expressed need of the City.

The proposed 5 new two-family units generated from the project would be 3bedroom, 2-bathroom units. They would also have the following Affordability/ Workforce Housing components:

- Workforce housing at 80-100% Area Median Income (AMI) (\$123,100 -\$156,300) based on US Dept. of Housing & Urban Development (HUD) guidelines for a household of 4
- Commitment to have one unit at 80% AMI (\$123,100)
- Rent would be 30% of AMI per HUD guidelines
- Duration of workforce housing designation: 10-15 years

Goal 2: Year-round Destination Bridgeworks Campus Upgrades

Updates

- Project sponsor agreed to a 25% private match, 75% NYF funding, using their own resources to anticipate the project expenses
- Project sponsor hired a professional to get more accurate cost estimates

The project include three components:

- Resilient plantings/flower beds NO UPDATES
- Exterior upgrades to facilitate installation of murals **NO UPDATES**
- Creation of exterior roof deck for additional flexible workspace and events. Work includes (more refined scope & cost)
 - Outdoor kitchen
 - Equipment for a retractable roof for shade
 - Reinforcement of the existing roof/floor
 - Barrier around edge of the perimeter of the building
 - Upgrade to outdoor electric capacity



Small Project Fund

Description

The Small Project Fund can include a range of downtown projects such as façade enhancements, building renovation improvements to commercial or mixed-use spaces, business assistance, or public art. Funds are capped at \$300,000. Eligible activities include building renovations (i.e., façade/storefront renovations), public art, and soft costs, (i.e., architecture or engineering expenses).

- Comprehensive study of Complete Streets in Long Beach to maximize pedestrian and bike safety in the Park Ave corridor. The study would incorporate parking, emergency management, sanitation, and other relevant factors to develop viable, actionable improvements.
- Long Beach Boulevard crossing studies: Long Beach Boulevard and Park Ave; Long Beach Boulevard and East Pine Street.

- End of November: BFJ to send Draft Plan to State
- Mid December: Final NYF Plan due to State

What Happens When the NYF Plan Is Complete?

Management and Implementation Strategy

- Project award winners should be announced in early 2024.
- Public improvement projects will be undertaken by the City of Long Beach.
- The Small Project Fund will be administered locally by the City. Recipients will be selected through a competitive process.
- NYF funding is reimbursable—rather than an up-front grant, project sponsors are reimbursed for expenses incurred.
